Comprehension is the ultimate goal of learning to read!

At Coorara teaching all students to read is a whole school focus. This year we are focusing on developing students reading comprehension skills. To be a good reader students need a toolkit of strategies they use to help comprehend what they read.



Good readers make connections to self (what does this remind me of in my life?), to other known texts (what does this remind me of in another text?) and to the world (what does this remind me of in the real world/)

Good readers create a mental image as they read. This is called **visualising**. To help create a picture in your mind, we ask What can we see, hear, feel, smell and taste?





Good readers **determine the important** bits as they read. For example the important parts of a text are the headings, sub headings, main events and the author's message.

Good readers make **inferences and predictions**. To make an inference good readers combine clues in their head with clues from the text. It is sometimes referred to as reading between the lines.





Good readers **ask questions** before they read, during reading and after they read.

Good readers use their own words to **summarise** the key ideas

ROOM 19 - VISUALISERS

This term, in Room 19, we have been practicing the reading comprehension strategy visualising. Visualising is when the audience uses their prior knowledge and experiences to create a mental image of what is happening in the text. Our task

required students to use either a piece of text from a book they are reading, or they could research song lyrics and choose a passage to represent in their visualisation. The children used their creativity to create their visualisations.





Our class had to choose a book or song to visualise.

First we took notes, next we did a draft sketch and then we did our final product. The last thing we had to do was add in quotes from the text for the border.

ANCIENT CHINA

In Room 19 this term, we have been learning about Ancient China. Our 2 art pieces we are creating, include, a replica porcelain vase or an Ancient Chinese scroll about a god or deity. Dear Families,

If you received Child Care Subsidy (CCS) for 2018-19, you must confirm your income with Centrelink. This includes CCS paid directly to you and CCS paid on your behalf to a child care provider.

Most parents have already confirmed their income, but if you haven't, do it now.

If you don't confirm your 2018-19 income by 30 June 2020, your CCS will stop from 13 July 2020.

To confirm your income with Centrelink, you and your partner need to either:

- lodge your tax returns with the Australian Taxation Office (ATO)
- complete an 'Advise non-lodgement of tax return' with Centrelink, if you don't need to lodge a tax
 return


You complete the 'Advise non-lodgement of tax return' in your Centrelink online account through myGov or your Express Plus Centrelink mobile app.

If you've already confirmed your family income for 2018-19, there's nothing else you need to do.
